thank outgoing Governor Merissa Mirani for serving on our Legislative Committee and helping us understand the new bills being discussed. I'd also like to take this moment and thank the heartbeat of our community which is Frank Tewey, Leslie Coble and Dottie Ballard. Frank just completed his first full year as our Town Manager and did a fantastic job keeping the beach attendants fully staffed for the entire season and helping to keep the day-to-day operations functioning. Leslie has always been the face of our office who helps maintain the history and culture we've developed as a community. Last but not least is Dottie, which is our silent leader.

With the new year we all have a chance for a new beginning so if you're interested in becoming more active in your local community, PLEASE join our monthly BOG meetings or get involved with the many great organizations that help make this place so unique and special. Board In Brief CSCIA Board Of Governors Monthly Meeting **JANUARY 8, 2024**

In attendance in person: Pres. Beau Breeden, Govs. Jennifer Connor, Ed Haves, Mary Lamb, Matt Layman, Kim Pollack, Jerome Zadera, Town Manager Frank Tewey, Budget Committee members Charlie Shoul and Thor Harris, and guest Stacy Wildberger. In attendance online: Govs. Joe Angel, Cheri Fairchild, Neil Macindoe, Marissa Miante and Michele Shipley.

Pres. Breeden called the meeting to order at 7:33 pm. He thanked all for coming and reported that yellow maintenance fee postcards are due by March 1, \$10 per tax lot. The Annual Meeting is January 9. A moment of silence was held for the life lost in the Cape on January 7.

MINUTES AND FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Minutes of the Dec 11, 2023, BOG meeting were reviewed and approved unanimously.

The financial statements for Oct and Nov 2023 were discussed, specifically regarding timing of income. Cash balances of the CSCIA bank accounts are about \$166,600 for the operating funds, \$203K in grant funds, \$237,700 in piers funds, and the Special Community Benefits District (SCBD) operating funds of about \$72K. Motions passed unanimously.

TOWN MANAGER REPORT

- Town Manager Tewey said that yellow maintenance fee payments are coming in and due Mar 1.
- The presentation by AA County Traffic Engineering on installation of traffic devices is postponed until the Apr 23 Quarterly meeting.
- The proposed budget for fiscal year 2025 (FY25) comes up for vote at the Jan 9 Annual Meeting.
- · Security officers are covering 19 of 31 shifts in Jan. Two officers have resigned. The going rate for off-duty police is higher than we pay, overtime is available, so few officers are interested in Cape shifts.
- The Drive-In Movie Night was postponed due to weather and poorly attended. Another will be attempted in warmer weather.
- Mr. Tewey is researching automated gates for the main beach.
- · One building request was processed and one reminder sent for final plans. One pier/bulkhead agreement is in the process of being recorded. One will be discussed in closed session.
- Bill 88-23 regarding defining a front yard passed the county council on Dec 18. Maryland Legislative Session begins Jan10.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Broadneck Council of Communities (BCC): Pat Lynch, who helped establish the council in 2007 as a continuation of the Broadneck Federation founded in the 1970's, is stepping down as president. They are looking for volunteers to support the Broadneck peninsula.

Budget: Gov. Zadera reported that if the budget is passed at the Annual Meeting, it must be submitted to the county.

Caper: Gov. Lamb said photos are requested for the February Year in Review issue, but must be submitted quickly.

Clubhouse: Gov. Lamb reported rentals are steady but slower in Jan as expected. Options for a cleaning company are being explored.

Events: Gov. Lamb said all equipment for the Drive In worked. The next event will be the Easter Egg Hunt.

Piers: Pres. Breeden reported that contract offers will be sent the end of Jan and are due in mid-March. Late fees of \$50 will apply for one week after, then the process of slip assignments will begin. Pier Admin Williams is training Matt Cox to take over while she is on a leave of absence. Please be patient as he learns the system. Bids will be sought for repair work to be done.

Strawberry Festival: Gov. Lamb reported that planning is in full swing.

OLD BUSINESS

Pres. Breeden reported the Little Magothy River Association (LMRA) decided to not do a small dredge of the inlet this winter as costs were going to be significantly more than expected. The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) grant process for the National Fish and Wildlife Federation (NFWF) has been delayed due to the lack of a passed budget. It is unknown if applications will need to be resubmitted if funding becomes available. Funds for contracts with Alliance of the Chesapeake remain in escrow. Other grants will be sought.

Gov. Layman asked if there was an update on the clubhouse field fence and was told there is not.

Everyone should have received their annual maintenance fee renewal postcards in the mail. Keep a lookout for the YELLOW postcard(s) in the mail! Fees are due by March 1st whether the card is received or not, so contact the Office if you have not received your card by February 1st. Maintenance fees can be paid in person at the office, by using our 24-hour drop box, or mailing them to us. The office is open Monday through Friday (except major holidays) from 8:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Payment must be made by check or money order (if mailing or using the dropbox) or cash, check or money order if paying in person. We don't accept any credit cards or debit cards! If you wish to receive parking stickers and guest passes, you must provide complete vehicle information on the postcard. Stickers will be mailed out in April.

Pier contracts will be mailed out on February 1st. Contract fees are due by March 19th.

NEW BUSINESS

- Gov. Lamb reported that the LMRA applied to be a Cape Recognized Organization. A motion to approve the application pending submittal of an acceptable list of members passed unanimously after discussion regarding the 80% Cape resident threshold.
- Pres. Breeden announced that the county budget listening session for our district will be held at Severna Park High School on Jan 25, and you must register to attend. Information will go out on Facebook and the website.
- He noted that the Jan/Feb issue of Tide Magazine from the Coastal Conservation Association featured an article about oyster reef balls created in memory of Noah Anderson. The balls will be placed off Dobbin Island to spell NOAH and will be visible as such with boat sonar.
- Pres. Breeden reported a meeting will be held with the Critical Area mitigation team regarding the new firehouse. Six acres are needed to create new mitigation areas. The county is interested in using Cape properties but those have long-term easements, are used for Cape residents, and/or may be needed for future mitigation for Cape projects. Areas where trees could be planted will be discussed.

COMMENTS

Stacy Wildberger said the Cape Conservation Corps (CCC) is establishing a scholarship for Broadneck High School seniors entering environmental science majors. CCC volunteers cleared ivy and leaves at the Little Magothy beach (LMB) and will work with Save Our Trees to remove ivy at Deep Creek on Feb 3. In the spring they will work along the driveway at LMB.

ADJOURNMENT

A motion was made to adjourn to closed session and approved unanimously. The meeting was adjourned to closed session at 8:14 pm. The closed session occurred from 8:14 pm to 8:31 pm. Jan 9, 2024. The CSCIA Board of Govs. meeting was adjourned at 8:31 p.m.

February: American Heart Month

Show your Heart Some Love!

The American Heart Association, and The National Institutes of Health reserve the month of February for HEART HEALTH AWARENESS!

Did you know that heart disease is the #1 leading cause of

death and also oftentimes <u>preventable</u>? That's right! What you do (or do not do) now can increase your chances for long lasting heart health throughout your life.

Your heart is a muscle that is responsible for pumping oxygen rich blood to every single part of your body using the pathways/tunnels of arteries and veins. One strong squeeze sends blood away from the heart through the arteries where it travels to every inch of your body. Veins bring blood back to the heart where it gets pumped to the lungs to get more oxygen, ready to be sent out again. Your body is one big circuit of veins and arteries that rely on the big squeeze and relaxation of the heart! Therefore, the entire circuit must remain healthy for things to keep running smoothly!

So what do I need to do to keep this system healthy?

1. Keep your blood pressure in a healthy range!

Normal blood pressure is 120/80 mmHg. The first number is called the systolic and is the pressure of the blood when it is pumped out of the heart. The second number is called diastolic and is the pressure between heartbeats when the heart is filling with blood. Keeping these numbers in a healthy range means the walls of your veins and arteries are protected since too high pressures can cause them to loose their elastic nature and burst.

Hypertension develops when blood flows through the veins and arteries at a consistently higher than normal pressure. Hypertension raises your risk of heart attack, stroke, and kidney damage!

2. Keep your cholesterol in a healthy range!

Cholesterol is a type of fat in your body, and your body needs some cholesterol to make other essential substances in your body like vitamin D and hormones, but the body makes all the cholesterol it needs so we don't ever need any extra!. We have two types in our body: "Good" cholesterol known as HDL (think "H" for Happy) and "bad" cholesterol known as LDL (think "L" for Loser)! We also have a type of fat called "triglycerides" that our body uses for energy. We want lots of the "good" stuff (HDL) and not a lot of the "bad" stuff (LDL), along with the right balance of triglycerides.



Too little of the "good" stuff (HDL) and too much LDL and triglycerides is bad because that extra fat sticks to the walls of our arteries making the space for blood to flow less and less. It can even lead to a full blockage of an artery causing a heart attack or stroke. Aim to keep your total cholesterol level less than 200!

This all sounds good, but how do I actually do these things?

First, know your numbers! That means getting your annual (at least) physical and blood work. You can only find out your cholesterol levels through a blood test so you must see your doctor. Follow your doctors advice if your cholesterol is high or if you have hypertension. He or she may prescribe medication.

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On a day to day basis, here are the basics to keep your heart in good working order:

- Exercise daily: aim for 30 minutes per day of movement. Good ol' walking counts so grab a neighborhood buddy and walk! Aim to get your heart pumping and a little sweat going. You don't have to train for a marathon or spend hours in the gym (although those things are okay too!) to keep your heart healthy. Movement matters!
- Eat lots of whole fruits and vegetables. Aim for 1/3 to 1/2 of your plate to be green veggies at lunch and dinner and fresh fruit at breakfast. Eat red meat in very small portions and never make meat the star of your plate.
- Cook foods that are low in sodium and unhealthy fats. For example, choose olive oil over butter and fresh foods over processed.
- Quit smoking!
- · Limit alcohol.
- Aim for 7-8 hours of sleep at night.
- Practice gratitude and actively work on decreasing stress

And remember, small changes practiced with consistency add up. Choose one heart healthy goal and work on it. Once that goal is a solid part of your life work on another one. Your heart will thank you for it!

We hope Capers are out enjoying the sunshine and noticing all the lovely winter blooms that we can enjoy on mild days in our gardens. Lenten roses, snow drops, camellias, winter jasmine, and witch hazels are some of the beautiful and fragrant blooms we humans and our pollinator friends can enjoy in February. This gardener noticed a neighbor's camellia covered with

blooms and absolutely buzzing with bees, and local beekeepers observe

that their bees often emerge to find flowers on mild winter days. According to the Royal Horticultural Society, "The more flowers a garden can offer throughout the year – regardless of plant origin (native or non-native) – the greater number of bees, hoverflies

and other pollinating insects it will attract and support." Enjoy those winter bloomers with our pollinator friends! A notable gardening development we'd like to report is that the USDA has updated the USA horticultural zone map. As the planet warms, we are now zone 8a (formerly zone 7a) – no wonder so many of our Members

report that they can overwinter cannas and even dahlias now, without digging up the tubers. In light of that, we hope to add these awesome tropical plants to this year's **Plant Sale on Saturday May 18**th – stay tuned!



Winter may make some of us want to hide away, but we gardeners are a hardy bunch! Sunshine and fresh air do a body good, even in winter, so some Cape gardeners use wintertime to build or repair trellises, gates, or paths, basking in the sun like our woodland friends. Pruning crape myrtles and fountain grasses in late February, and then adding mulch, are some other great ways to get out in the garden. Some gardeners use their empty planters to root tip-cuttings of lavender or rosemary, and others have already started winter-sowing seeds




